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"Ingredients" for Incentivizing a Local Circular Economy

Develop a plan

- o Where are you now?
- O Where do you want to go?
- What is a realistic timeframe to achieve this goal?
- o Outline the steps to get there, milestones to hit, and when

Engage all stakeholders

- Residents, businesses, waste & recycling contractors and processors, local industries and manufacturing
- Understand needs, concerns, opportunities



"Ingredients" for Incentivizing a Local Circular Economy

Educate

- Culture shift & change in mindset thinking about waste
- o Involve all sectors
- o Incorporate public outreach and marketing campaigns

Perform a waste characterization study

- o Establish a baseline to measure progress
- Identify most common or problematic materials to help prioritize actions



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"Ingredients" for Incentivizing a Local Circular Economy

- Streamline existing regulations & standards
 - Ensure all members & sectors of the community have the same level of access to and requirements for waste diversion
- Identify & incentivize the waste hierarchy
 - Develop a framework to prioritize actions and to guide the development of policies & programs
- Practice sustainable (and local) purchasing
 - o Drive demand for recycled and sustainable products



"Ingredients" for Incentivizing a Local Circular Economy

- Regulate private sector production and consumption; examples include:
 - Financial incentives such as tax breaks for producing/consuming sustainable, circular products
 - o Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) regulations
- Create and leverage partnerships
 - o Public-private partnerships are key
 - o Partnerships could be with think tanks, local universities, local chamber of commerce, non-profits, inter- and intra-governmental



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"Ingredients" for Incentivizing a Local Circular Economy

- Invest in infrastructure and technology
 - o Partnerships will play a key role can help fund capital investments
 - o Bonds and other governmental financing
- Use funding creatively
 - Separate funds, like waste management-type fees
 - Single-use item fees/taxes
 - o Grants for local governments (Closed Loop Fund, Recycling Partnership, etc.)
- Pilot new programs
 - o Achieve community/political support to finance, scale
 - o Allows for testing, working out issues
